The author uses direct and indirect characterization to help you understand the character.

**Direct** characterization is what the author directly tells you about the character.

**Indirect** characterization is when <u>the author give you clues or hints, and you have make inferences</u> as to what this is telling you about the character.

Use **STEAL** to help you better understand your character.

- 4. In the center of the poster, draw your character based on direct and indirect characterization in the novel. Leave room on the poster to glue the character bubbles around the drawing. Use the examples as a model.
